The Gospel of the Lord

FROM FR. HENRY

Dear friends,

For four weeks in a row starting with the Gospel story about Jesus' miracle to multiply five barley loaves and two fish seen as the metaphor of the Sacrament of the Eucharist Jesus officially established at the Last Supper, we have Gospel after Gospel recounting Jesus' efforts to tell us what he means about the Eucharist and its various dimensions.

He took them from the experience of the miraculous meal freely given to them in the most difficult circumstances

to the spiritual and transcendental experience of what we call the Sacrament today, and this move obviously was too much for them because they were unprepared to embrace such a new concept. They, as we see, in the Gospel last Sunday began to question his claim to be 'the bread that came down from heaven', the one they thought as impossible, and became more agitated as we heard from the Gospel this Sunday when Jesus told them the bread he was going to offer is his flesh. It was more challenging as he solemnly declared that those who eat his body and drink his blood will have eternal life.

The disciples could have had trouble grasping the Body and Blood concept Jesus was teaching here, though they kept silent and chose not to argue with their Master, and they perhaps just began to somehow understand it while witnessing what Jesus did at the Last Supper with the bread and the chalice. He raised them up, said the blessing, asked them to share and most significantly instructed them to continue to celebrate it in memory of him. 'Do this in remembrance of me,' said Jesus to the disciples gathered around him for the occasion (cf. Lk 22.19).

How can the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ? This question challenged not just the crowds following Jesus then, but generations and generations of his followers ever since. There have been various attempts to tackle the question, and above all the old aged concept of TRANSUBSTANTIATION beginning from the 12th century has remained the most popular one. It basically means to say that the appearances of the bread and wine remain the same while their substance changes into the body and blood of Christ at the Institution Narrative.

Let us give praise and thanks to God for his gift of faith to help us appreciate and treasure the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and pray that our participation in the table of the Eucharist today will give us strength to continue our pilgrim journey. Have a Eucharist-filled weekend,

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

Today the Gospel of the liturgy (Jn 6:41-51) tells us about the reaction of the Judeans to the statement of Jesus, who says: "I have come down from heaven" (*Jn* 6:38). They are scandalized.

They murmur among themselves: "Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How does he now say, 'I have come down from heaven'?" (Jn 6:42). And they murmur like this. Let us pay attention to what they say. They are convinced that Jesus cannot have come from heaven, because he is

the son of a carpenter and because his mother and his relatives are common people, familiar, normal people, like so many others. "How could God manifest Himself in such an ordinary way?", they say. They are obstructed in their faith by their preconception of his humble origins and they are obstructed by the presumption, therefore, that they have nothing to learn from him. Preconceptions and presumptions, how much harm they do! They prevent sincere dialogue, a coming together of brothers and sisters: beware of preconceptions and presumptions. They have their rigid mindsets, and there is no space in their heart for what does not fit into them, for what they are unable to catalogue and file away in the dusty shelves of their security. And this is true: very often our securities are closed

up. dustv. like old books.

And yet they are people who observe the law, who give alms, who respect fasts and times of prayer. Indeed, Christ has already performed various miracles (cf. Jn 2:1-11,4,43-54; 5:1-9; 6:1-25). How is it that all this does not help them to recognize in Him the Messiah? Why does it not help them? Because they carry out their religious practices not so much in order to listen to the Lord, but rather to find in them the confirmation of what they think. They are closed to the Word of the Lord, and look for confirmation of their own thoughts. This is demonstrated by the fact that they do not even take the trouble to ask Jesus for an explanation; they limit themselves to murmuring among themselves against Him (cf. Jn 6:41), as though to reassure each other of what they are convinced, and they shut themselves in, they are closed up in an impenetrable fortress. And so, they are unable to believe. The closure of the heart: how much harm it does, how much harm!

Let us pay attention to all of this, because at times the same thing can happen to us too, in our life and in our prayer: it can happen to us, that is, that instead of truly listening to what the Lord has to say to us, we look to Him and others only for a confirmation of what we think, a confirmation of our convictions, our judgements, which are prejudices. But this way of addressing God does not help us to encounter God, to truly encounter Him, nor to open ourselves up to the gift of His light and His grace, in order to grow in goodness, to do His will and to overcome failings and difficulties. Brothers and sisters, faith and prayer, when they are true, open the mind and the heart; they do not close them. When you find a person who is closed in their mind, in prayer, that faith and that prayer are not

Let us ask ourselves, then: in my life of faith, am I capable of being truly silent within myself, and listening to God? Am I willing to welcome His voice, beyond my own mindset, and also, with His help, to overcome my fears? May Mary help us to listen with faith to the Lord's voice, and to do His will courageously.

As we continue to commend to the Lord the victims of those events, and of all wars, let us renew our intense prayer for peace, especially for troubled Ukraine, the Middle East, Palestine, Israel, Sudan and Myanmar. Today is the feast of Saint Clare: I address an affectionate thought to all the Clarissians, and in particular those of Vallegloria, with whom I have a beautiful friendship.

Let us also pray for the victims of the tragic air crash in Brazil.

And I greet you all, Romans and pilgrims from Italy and many countries, in particular the group of students from the minor seminary of Bergamo, who have come on foot from Assisi, in a several days-long pilgrimage. Are you tired? No? Good. You are good!

I wish you all a happy Sunday. And to you, too young people of the Immacolata: happy Sunday! And please, do not forget to pray for me; you Brazilians, too, who I can see clearly. To all of you, thank you! Enjoy your lunch, and arrivederci!

14. The elderly, who frequently feel lonely and abandoned, also deserve signs of hope. Esteem for the treasure that they are, their life experiences, their accumulated wisdom and the contribution that they can still make, is incumbent on the Christian community and civil society, which are called to cooperate in strengthening the covenant between generations. Here I would also mention *grandparents*, who represent the passing on of faith and wisdom to the younger generation. May they find support in the gratitude of their children and the love of their grandchildren, who discover in them their roots and a source of understanding and encouragement.

15. I ask with all my heart that hope be granted to the billions of the poor, who often lack the essentials of life. Before the constant tide of new forms of impoverishment, we can easily grow inured and resigned. Yet we must not close our eyes to the dramatic situations that we now encounter all around us, not only in certain parts of the world. Each day we meet people who are poor or impoverished; they may even be our next-door neighbours. Often they are homeless or lack sufficient food for the day. They suffer from exclusion and indifference on the part of many. It is scandalous that in a world possessed of immense resources, destined largely to producing weapons, the poor continue to be "the majority of the planet's population, billions of people. These days they are mentioned in international political and economic discussions, but one often has the impression that their problems are brought up as an afterthought, a question which gets added almost out of duty or in a tangential way, if not treated merely as collateral damage. Indeed, when all is said and done, they frequently remain at the bottom of the pile". [7] Let us not forget: the poor are almost always the victims, not the ones to blame.

Appeals for hope

16. Echoing the age-old message of the prophets, the Jubilee reminds us that the goods of the earth are not destined for a privileged few, but for everyone. The rich must be generous and not avert their eyes from the faces of their brothers and sisters in need. Here I think especially of those who lack water and food: hunger is a scandal, an open wound on the body of our humanity, and it summons all of us to a serious examination of conscience. I renew my appeal that "with the money spent on weapons and other military expenditures, let us establish a global fund that can finally put an end to hunger and favour development in the most impoverished countries, so that their citizens will not resort to violent or illusory situations, or have to leave their countries in order to seek a more dignified life". [8]

Another heartfelt appeal that I would make in light of the coming Jubilee is directed to the more affluent nations. I ask that they acknowledge the gravity of so many of their past decisions and determine to forgive the debts of countries that will never be able to repay them. More than a question of generosity, this is a matter of justice. It is made all the more serious today by a new form of injustice which we increasingly recognize, namely, that "a true 'ecological debt' exists, particularly between the global North and South, connected to commercial imbalances with effects on the environment and the disproportionate use of natural resources by certain countries over long periods of time". [9] As sacred Scripture teaches, the earth is the Lord's and all of us dwell in it as "aliens and tenants" (Lev 25:23). If we really wish to prepare a path to peace in our world, let us commit ourselves to remedying the remote causes of injustice, settling unjust and unpayable

POPE FRANCIS to Altar severs: 'Share Jesus with others' Bv Lisa Zengarini

In his address to nearly 50,000 altar servers gathered in St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis highlighted the deep meaning of the motto chosen for the international event: "With you" (Isa 41:10). This expression, he noted, "encapsulates the mystery of love", which is the "mystery of our lives." The altar servers had gathered in the square with the Pope as part of their weeklong pilgrimage to Rome, now in its second day.

Being with God

The Pope remarked that in the liturgy they serve, these two words refer first of all to God who, in the Eucharist, "becomes a real and concrete presence in the Body and Blood of Christ."

"Your experience of serving the liturgy reminds me that the first subject, the agent of this 'with you', is God."

"When we receive Holy Communion," Pope Francis explained, "we experience that Jesus is 'with us' both spiritually and physically," not in words, but with that "act of love, which is the Eucharist."

Because Jesus is with us, we can truly be with Him

In Communion, the Pope continued, altar servers too "can say to the Lord Jesus, 'I am with you", not in words, "but with your heart and your body, with your love." By ministering with an attentive mind, heart and body, "the mystery of God who is with you gives you the ability to be with others in a new way" thus carrying out "His commandment to 'love one another as I have loved you'." he said.

"The 'with you' of Jesus, thanks to His love, becomes my, your, our 'with you' that we can share with others."

Being close to our neighbors

Being with Jesus, therefore, implies also being close to our neighbors, "not in words, but in deeds, with gestures, with your heart", even to "those we might not like", who are different from us; to foreigners; to those "whom we feel do not understand us"; who never come to church; and who say they do not believe in God. Concluding, Pope Francis, thanked the organizers for choosing such meaningful motto, and the pilgrims for coming to Rome "to share the joy of belonging to Jesus, of being servants of his love, servants of His wounded heart that heals our wounds, that saves us from death, and that gives us eternal life."

Cardinal Hollerich: Altar serving is 'a service to God and others'

The audience was introduced Cardinal Jean Claude Hollerich who is accompanying the pilgrims throughout the week.

The Archbishop of Luxembourg noted that the motto "With you" is an invitation to be "true friends of all men with the help of Christ". However, he remarked, we are true friends only when we extend our hands to serve and help those in need: "the poor, the persecuted, the oppressed, the homeless, the unemployed, the refugees or those without a country."

The celebration

The Pope's greeting was followed by a liturgy of the Word with six prayer intentions of the faithful introduced by Cardinal Hollerich in German, French, Hungarian, and Portuguese in which participants also prayed for peace in the world.

At the end of the celebration Pope Francis greeted each of the bishops accompanying the altar servers and then toured St. Peter's Square to greet the young pilgrims.






