GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 8:27-35

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him.

And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends.

'Inconsistency on the part of pastors and the faithful between what they say and what they do, between word and manner of life, is undermining the church's credibility.' This is the quote from Pope Francis and he was right in pointing out the danger the Church has to face in terms of credibility if her members both Church authority and lay people fail to be consistent between their words and actions, and I tend to agree with the pope's comment due to what I have experienced in the Church.

There have been times I was completely lost for words, when people appear to be so holy in church suddenly turn into a beast because of trivial matters. These people obviously fail to meet St James' standard about what it means to be the people of faith, that they need to prove their profession of a living faith through their good works, and without good works it is a dead faith. In other words, good deeds would serve as key factors to determine whether someone truly believes in God.

Some of us then might pose the question of what faith is truly about, and the answer could be found in what Peter told Jesus in the Gospel today when asked by Jesus who he was. 'You are the Christ (the Anointed),' said Peter. This is Peter's profession of faith proclaiming Jesus as the Son of God sent to bring us salvation, and such a faith according to Jesus in the following parts of the Gospel account requires his disciples to renounce themselves, embrace the suffering the Cross symbolizes and commit themselves in following the footstep of Jesus. These requirements perhaps are the good deeds St James talked about earlier in the second reading aimed to encourage people in his community to show their faith in Jesus by means of their concrete actions.

Let us pray the grace to help us profess our faith in Jesus not just in words, but also in the works we do for others to show our genuine love and care for them, and also for us to demonstrate our self-renouncing effort making us better followers of Jesus every day.

REPORT FROM THE LAST PASTORAL COUNCIL MEETING

The meeting started with a reflection upon the Settlers and Pioneers theologies highlighting the differences between Church members in the ways we look at the Church and this article is made available for our parishioners to read this weekend. As usual, there were reports from various groups in the parish and a good amount of time was given to talk about the Family Group movement we are going to introduce to this community.

THE PASSIONIST FAMILY GROUP MOVEMENT:

The Passionist Family Group Movement (PFGM) began in Australia over 50 years ago to meet a very evident need for parishioners and to get to know one another and so build a strong community sense and commitment to each other. The idea is that you meet with other parishioners occasionally for low cost or no cost outings. These gatherings, in turn, enrich your experience of the Parish formal celebrations and services. The motto of the Family Group Movement is "a family for all". You don't have to be a Catholic, a parent, old or young, married, or single - you just have to be yourself! If you do have kids, they really enjoy it, and you are able to share life's adventures and trials with the support of a caring community. Your Parish Pastoral Council has decided to start this initiative as an important strategy in connecting parishioners with the broader parish family. Dennis Farrar, a promoter of the Passionist Family Group Movement, will be speaking to us at all Masses on the weekend of the September 28/29 and extending an invitation to join. 

POPE FRANCIS' MESSAGE TO TIMORESE YOUTH: FREEDOM MEANS CHOOSING TO RESPECT OTHERS



By Devin Watkins Pope Francis concludes his three-day visit to Timor-Leste by meeting with young people, and urges them to be

responsible and free protagonists of the future of their nation. "I have two words of advice for you: make a mess and respect your elders!" Pope Francis offered those words of advice on Wednesday as he met with the young people of Timor-Leste in the capital, Dili. The encounter was held at the Congress Centre and was the final public event of the Holy Father's Apostolic Journey to Timor-Leste. In his address, the Pope noted that young people make up a clear majority of the population of 1.4 million, of whom over 95% are Catholic, praising their enthusiasm in living the faith. Pope Francis said he would never forget the smiles he found on the faces of the

Timorese people. He also invited Timorese youth to recall the sacrifices their forefathers made in laying the foundations of the nation, and took the opportunity to urge them to respect their elders. A society, he noted, has two treasures: young people and the elderly. "The children and the elderly," said the Pope. "A society that has so many children like you must take care of them. And one that has so many elderly, who are the memory, must respect and care for them." Pope Francis spoke briefly about the three values of "freedom, commitment, and fraternity." He recalled a saying in the Tetum language of Timor-Leste—"ukun rasik-an" which means "everyone is able to govern themselves." The Pope said young people should recall the true meaning and purpose of freedom. "To be free does not mean doing what we want," he said, noting that freedom means respecting others and caring for our common home. He also recalled the value of "fraternity" and the importance of reconciliation. "You, in this smiling country, have a wonderful history of heroism, faith, martyrdom, and above all, faith and reconciliation," he said. Pope Francis concluded his meeting with young Timorese by urging them to recall the example that Jesus gave in forgiveness and reconciliation.

POPE FRANCIS DISCUSSES PRAYER AND VOCATION WITH JESUITS IN SINGAPORE By Salvatore Cernuzio - Singapore

On the first day of his Apostolic Journey to Singapore, Pope Francis' only appointment was a "warm and fraternal" meeting with his Jesuit brothers serving in the country. The figures of Matteo Ricci and Father Pedro Arrupe, beacons for the Society of Jesus and the Universal Church, accompanied Pope Francis' hour-long dialogue with Singapore's Jesuits on Wednesday afternoon. The Pope arrived in the island state a few hours earlier for the fourth and final leg of his 45th Apostolic Journey abroad. It was a day dedicated to rest, except for the meeting with his brother Jesuits, the third of his trip to Southeast Asia and Oceania. The first was held in Jakarta, on 4 September, with 200 Jesuits; the second yesterday, in Dili, with about 40 members of the Society of Jesus.

A family meeting On Wednesday, in a hall at the St Francis Xavier Retreat Centre, situated on a hill half an hour from the city and commercial heart of Singapore, there were 25 Jesuits of different ages, mainly Singaporeans but also some from other areas, such as Malaysia.

"There were some young men, even one newly ordained, and some older ones, some sick. The Pope was very sweet with them," said Father Antonio Spadaro, Undersecretary of the Dicastery for Culture and Education, who has accompanied the Pope on this visit and was present at the meeting.

"The meeting lasted an hour as usual. And as usual, it was a very warm, fraternal meeting... the Pope wanted to keep speaking. It seemed that he did not want to leave this very intimate and family-like atmosphere."

The photos, circulated by Fr. Spadaro himself on his X account, show a smiling and relaxed Pope Francis. The priest said the Pope immediately opened the floor for questions. The topics were varied and demanding, beginning with the challenges that await the Church in this time and in these lands.

"The Pope made it clear that faith must enter into human challenges, and stressed the importance of Asia today as a key continent," Fr. Spadaro explained. "So Jesuits are called to live in this place, which presents very peculiar challenges."

POPE FRANCIS REMINDS YOUNG PEOPLE THEY ARE 'LIFE, HOPE AND FUTURE' By Linda Bordoni - Singapore

Among the highlights during every leg of Pope Francis' apostolic visits, are his rather "informal" meetings with young people.

As I was leaving the Convention Centre in Dili, Pope Francis, true to form, stayed behind to connect with the crowd. His flight to Singapore was delayed by about 45 minutes! It struck me that during almost every trip, he ends his journey by spending time with young people.

In Timor-Leste, where the majority of the population is under 35, he tossed aside his prepared speech and just talked with them, answering their questions. He gave them advice on how to navigate life, technology, and family. And, of course, he reminded them of their huge responsibility as they represent a call to "life, hope and the future." This, he said, "is why young people must commit."

Before taking off In Papua New Guinea, he spoke to over 10,000 young people in a stadium. His message? "The world needs your dreams and courage." He expressed joy for having spent time in the country "where the ocean meets the sky," where over 800 different languages are spoken. A country inhabited by many young people to whom he said: "I did not want to leave here without meeting you, because you are the hope for the future."

And in Jakarta, a day before he left, (for logistic reasons I presume), he spoke about interreligious harmony and fraternity encouraging the youth to live up to Indonesia's promise of "Harmony in Diversity".

Together, they even planted a mangrove tree, symbolizing their shared commitment to protect the environment.

Now, here in Singapore, it's his final stop before heading back to Rome. I'm sure, as always, he'll leave them with a message of hope and a reminder to take action—for the planet, and for humanity.

BULL OF INDICTION OF THE ORDINARY JUBILEEOF THE YEAR 2025 FRANCIS BISHOP OF ROME SERVANT OF THE SERVANTS OF GOD TO ALL WHO READ THIS LETTERMAY HOPE FILL YOUR HEARTS

24. Hope finds its supreme witness in *the Mother of God*. In the Blessed Virgin, we see that hope is not naive optimism but a gift of grace amid the realities of life. Like every mother, whenever Mary looked at her Son, she thought of his future. Surely she kept pondering in her heart the words spoken to her in the Temple by the elderly Simeon: "This child is destined for the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed, so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed – and a sword will pierce your own soul too" (*Lk* 2:34-35). At the foot of the cross, she witnessed the passion and death of Jesus, her innocent son. Overwhelmed with grief, she nonetheless renewed her "fiat", never abandoning her hope and trust in God. In this way, Mary cooperated for our sake in the fulfilment of all that her Son had foretold in announcing that he would have to "undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again" (*Mk* 8:31). In the travail of that sorrow, offered in love, Mary became our Mother, the Mother of Hope. It is not by chance that popular piety continues to invoke the Blessed Virgin as *Stella Maris*, a title that bespeaks the sure hope that, amid the tempests of this life, the Mother of God comes to our aid, sustains us and encourages us to persevere in hope and trust.

In this regard, I would note that the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City is preparing to celebrate, in 2031, the fifth centenary of Our Lady's first apparition. Through Juan Diego, the Mother of God brought a revolutionary message of hope that she continues to bring to every pilgrim and all the faithful: "Am I not here, who am your Mother?" That message continues to touch hearts in the many Marian shrines throughout the world, where countless pilgrims commend to the holy Mother of God their cares, their sorrows and their hopes. During the Jubilee Year, may these shrines be sacred places of welcome and privileged spaces for the rebirth of hope. I encourage all pilgrims to Rome to spend time in prayer in the Marian shrines of the City, in order to venerate the Blessed Mother and to implore her protection. I am confident that everyone, especially the suffering and those most in need, will come to know the closeness of Mary, the most affectionate of mothers, who never abandons her children and who, for the holy people of God, is "a sign of certain hope and comfort".

25. In our journey towards the Jubilee, let us return to Scripture and realize that it speaks to us in these words: "May we who have taken refuge in him be strongly encouraged to seize the hope set before us. We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters the inner shrine behind the curtain, where Jesus, a forerunner on our behalf, has entered" (*Heb* 6:18-20). Those words are a forceful encouragement for us never to lose the hope we have been given, to hold fast to that hope and to find in God our refuge and our strength.

The image of the anchor is eloquent; it helps us to recognize the stability and security that is ours amid the troubled waters of this life, provided we entrust ourselves to the Lord Jesus. The storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death. This hope, which transcends life's fleeting pleasures and the achievement of our immediate goals, makes us rise above our trials and difficulties, and inspires us to keep pressing forward, never losing sight of the grandeur of the heavenly goal to which we have been called.

The coming Jubilee will thus be a Holy Year marked by the hope that does not fade, our hope in God. May it help us to recover the confident trust that we require, in the Church and in society, in our interpersonal relationships, in international relations, and in our task of promoting the dignity of all persons and respect for God's gift of creation. May the witness of believers be for our world a leaven of authentic hope, a harbinger of new heavens and a new earth (cf. 2 Pet 3:13), where men and women will dwell in justice and harmony, in joyful expectation of the fulfilment of the Lord's promises.

Let us even now be drawn to this hope! Through our witness, may hope spread to all those who anxiously seek it. May the way we live our lives say to them in so many words: "Hope in the Lord! Hold firm, take heart and hope in the Lord!" (*Ps* 27:14). May the power of hope fill our days, as we await with confidence the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and glory, now and forever.
