FIRST READING A reading from the Book of Samuel 1:20-22. 24-28

Hannah conceived and gave birth to a son, and called him Samuel 'since' she said 'I asked the Lord for him.'

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 2:41-52

Every year the parents of Jesus used to go to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover. When he was twelve years old, they went up for the feast as usual. When they were on their way home after the feast, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem without his parents knowing it. They assumed he was with the caravan, and it was only after a day's journey that they went to look for him among their relations and acquaintances. When they failed to find him they went back to Jerusalem looking for him everywhere.

Three days later, they found him in the Temple, sitting among the doctors, listening to them, and asking them questions; and all those who heard him were astounded at his intelligence and his replies. They were overcome when they saw him, and his mother said to him, 'My child, why have you done this to us? See how worried your father and I have been, looking for you.' 'Why were you looking for me?' he replied. 'Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?' But they did not understand what he meant. He then went down with them and came to Nazareth and lived under their authority. His mother stored up all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom, in stature, and in favour with God and men.

The Gospel of the Lord

FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends,

This Sunday following Christmas we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family meant to highlight the importance of the Holy Family for the world as a model for key virtues necessary for human development. This feast was instituted by Pope Leo XIII in 1893 as an optional celebration for any diocese requesting it, and Pope Benedict XV added it to the universal Church calendar three years after the end of World War I in 1921 to be exact.

In the Gospel for the feast this year, Luke recounts the story about how Mary and Joseph took the twelve-yearold Jesus from Nazareth up to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, an annual celebration of Jewish people to commemorate their deliverance from Egypt. As we know, the distance between Nazareth and Jerusalem is about 146 kms, and if the Holy Family then travelled approximately 20 kms per day, it would take them about a week to make the journey.

From a religious education perspective, this trip highlights the great effort of Mary and Joseph to give the best religious education to Jesus as responsible parents. They themselves observed their religious tradition and helped Jesus to know and follow it as well.

The interesting part of the story is that at the return trip when the young Jesus deliberately made the decision to stay behind to mix and mingle with the smartest men in the religious world then, while Mary and Joseph thought he was with their relatives and friends. Seeing him nowhere amongst those travelling with them in other caravans, they decided to come back to Jerusalem and found him sitting among the doctors in the temple like nothing ever happened. When asked to explain his adventure, Jesus replied with the questions 'why were you looking for me?' and 'did you not know that I must by busy with my Father's affairs?' Mary and Joseph's response was very admirable, they remained calm and patient though they had no idea of what Jesus meant to say, and Mary herself, according to Luke, quietly treasured the experience in her heart. To me, Jesus was so fortunate to have such understanding parents like that, I'm afraid it wouldn't be quiet like that if he happened to meet some of the parents I know!

Let us pray especially today for all families in the Church, may parents be responsible faith educators to their children by teaching them our faith tradition and observing it, and may children always show respect to parents and grow in wisdom and in favour of God.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS

Dear brothers and sisters, *buongiorno*!

I am sorry not to be with you in the Square, but I am getting better and precautions must be taken.

Today the Gospel presents us with Mary who, after the annunciation of the Angel, visits Elizabeth, her elderly relative (cf. *Lk* 1:39-45), who is also expecting a child. Theirs is thus the meeting of two women rejoicing at the extraordinary gift of motherhood: Mary has just conceived Jesus, the Saviour of the world (cf. *Lk* 1:31-35), and Elizabeth, despite her advanced age, is carrying John, who will prepare the way before the Messiah (cf. *Lk* 1:13-17), John the Baptist.

They both have much to rejoice about, and perhaps we might feel they are far away, the protagonists of such great miracles that do not normally figure in our experience. The message the Evangelist wants to give us, a few days before Christmas, is this, it is different. Indeed, contemplating the miraculous signs of God's salvific action must never make us feel far from Him, but rather help us to recognize His presence and His love close to you, for example in the gift of every life, of every child, of his or her mother. The gift of life. I read, on the programme "A tua immagine", a beautiful thing that was written: *no child is a mistake*! The gift of life.

In the Square, even today, there will be mothers with their children, and perhaps they are some who are expecting. Please, let us not remain indifferent to their presence: let us learn to marvel at their beauty, as Elizabeth and Mary did, that beauty of expectant mothers. Let us bless mothers and give praise to God for the miracle of life! I like – I used to like, because now I cannot do it – when I used to take the bus, in the other diocese, when an expectant mother got on the bus, I would immediately offer her my seat: it is a gesture of hope and respect!

Brothers and sisters, in these days we like to create a festive atmosphere with lights, decorations and Christmas music. Let us remember, though, to express feelings of joy every time we encounter a mother who is carrying a child in her arms or in her womb. And when it happens to us, let us pray in our heart and let us say too, like Elizabeth, "Most blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!" (*Lk* 1:42); let us sing, like Mary, "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord" (*Lk* 1:46), so that every motherhood may be blessed, and in every mother in the world may the name of God be thanked and exalted, who entrusts men and women with the power to give life to children!

We will soon bless the "Bambinelli" you have brought. I have brought mine: this one was given to me by the

Archbishop of Santa Fé; it was made by native Ecuadorian people... the *Bambinelli* you have brought. We can ask ourselves, then, do I thank the Lord because He made Himself a man like us, to share in all of our existence, apart from sin? Do I praise the Lord and bless Him for every child who is born? When I encounter an expectant mother, am I kind to her? Do I support and defend the sacred value of the life of the little ones ever since their conception in the maternal womb?

May Mary, Blessed among women, make us capable of experiencing wonder and gratitude before the mystery of nascent life.

After the Angelus

Dear brothers and sisters!

I follow with attention and concern the news from Mozambique, and I wish to reiterate my message of hope, peace and reconciliation to that beloved people. I pray that dialogue and the quest for the common good, supported by faith and good will, may prevail over mistrust and discord.

Tormented Ukraine continues to be struck by attacks against the city, which at times damage schools, hospitals, and churches. May the weapons be silenced and Christmas carols resound! Let us pray for a ceasefire on all war fronts, in Ukraine, the Holy Land, in all the Middle East and the entire world, at Christmas. And with sorrow I think of Gaza, of so much cruelty; of the children machine-gunned, the bombing of schools and hospitals... So much cruelty!

I greet all of you, Romans and pilgrims, with affection. I greet the delegation of Italian citizens who live in territories that have been waiting for a long time for reclamation in order to protect their health. I express my closeness to these populations, especially to those who suffered the recent tragedy in Calenzano.

This morning, I had the joy of being with the children, with their mothers, who attend the Santa Marta Dispensary in the Vatican, run by the Vincentian Sisters. They are good nuns! Among them there is one nun who is like a grandmother to everyone, the good Sister Antoinette, whom I remember with great love. And these children – there were many of them! – filled my heart with joy. I repeat: "No child is a mistake".

And now I will bless the "Bambinelli": I have brought mine. The statuettes of the Infant Jesus that you, dear children and young people, have brought here and which then, returning home, you will put in the Nativity scene. I thank you for this simple but important gesture. I heartily bless all of you, your parents, your grandparents, your families! And please, do not forget your grandparents! May no-one remain alone during these days.

And I wish you all a good Sunday. Please, do not forget to pray for me. May the Lord bless you.

POPE FRANICS TO ROMAN CURIA: 'NEVER SPEAK ILL OF ONE ANOTHER' By Lisa Zengarini

"An ecclesial community lives in joyful and fraternal harmony to the extent that its members walk in the way of humility, refusing to think and speak ill of one another." In his annual Christmas address to the Roman Curia in the Vatican on Saturday, Pope Francis again cautioned against the destructive effects of negative rumours and gossip that, he said "poisons hearts and leads nowhere".

Focusing on Saint Paul's exhortation to "bless and not to curse" (Rm 12,14), the theme of his address, the Pope encouraged the members of the Curia to refrain from malicious speaking and to instead foster an harmonious and joyful working community.

"Gossip damages social bonds, poisons hearts, and leads nowhere. As people often say: gossip amounts to nothing."

More children killed in Gaza: "It's cruelty"

Before starting his reflection Pope Francis again turned his thoughts to the ongoing deadly war in Gaza, where on Friday Israeli airstrikes killed at least 25 Palestinians including seven children from the same family in Jabalia al-Nazl, as Israel continues to bombard the already devastated territory. "This is not war. This is cruelty", the Pope lamented in unscripted remarks. "I want to say this because it touches my heart."

Pope Francis then went on to reflect on the virtue of humility and its profound relevance to Christian life and community, connecting it to the mystery of the Incarnation. "Speaking well and not speaking ill is an expression of humility, and humility is the hallmark of the Incarnation and particularly the mystery of the Lord's Birth which we are about to celebrate", he said, referring to Saint Paul's words in his Letter to the Romans.

The path to humility: self-accusation

As a way to cultivate humility, Pope Francis suggested the practice of self-accusation, drawing on the teachings of early Christian spiritual masters like Dorotheus of Gaza. Dorotheus' wisdom advocated for introspection and the transformation of negative thoughts about others into positive ones. S

Self-accusation, Pope Francis remarked "is the basis for our being able to say 'no' to individualism and 'yes' to the ecclesial spirit of community" in which " all are guardians of one another and walk together in humility and charity," and "are gradually liberated from suspicion and distrust".

"When one sees a defect in a person, one can only talk to three people: with God with the person concerned and if one cannot talk to the person, with the one in the community who can take care of the case. Nothing more."

The practice of self-accusation, the Pope explained, mirrors the "condescension" (*synkatabasis*) of God in the Incarnation, an act of divine humility where "the Most High chooses to become little, like a mustard seed, like a man's seed in a woman's womb" taking "upon Himself the unbearable burden of the world's sin."

This reality, Pope Francis continued, is exemplified by the Virgin Mary, who willingly participated in God's plan with humility, making her an archetype this theological virtue : "She had no cause for self-accusation, yet she freely chose to cooperate fully in God's condescension, in the abasement of the Son and in the descent of the Holy Spirit", he said.

Blessed ourselves, let us bless others in turn

Recalling that the Incarnation of the Word shows us that God has not condemned us but blessed us, the Pope underscored that "precisely because we ourselves have been blessed, we can bless others in turn." This blessing flows from immersion in God's grace, through "moments of encounter, friendships, in a spirit of openness and generosity" that can help us renew and give new life to office work which can otherwise become arid.

"If our hearts are embraced by that primordial blessing, then we will be able to bless everyone, even those for whom we do not care or those who have treated us badly."

Artisans of blessing

The Pope went on to highlight that as members of the Church "sign and instrument of God's blessing for humanity", all of us are called to become "artisans of blessing", envisioning the Church as a vast river branching into numerous streams to bring God's blessing to the world. He described the Roman Curia as a "workshop" where diverse roles contribute to this mission: "I like to think of the Roman Curia as a great workshop in which there are any number of different jobs, but where everyone works for the same purpose: to bless others, and to spread the blessing of God and Mother Church in the world."

Hidden and humble work

The Pope particularly praised the "hidden" work carried out by office staff who prepare letters and convey blessings to individuals in need. Their humble work, he said, is a "means of spreading blessings", it is" the way of God Himself, who in Jesus condescends to share in our human condition, and thus gives us his blessing."

Concluding Pope Francis encouraged the members of the Roman Curia to embrace humility and to live as true "artisans of blessing" in the world, by not speaking ill of others: "We cannot write blessings and then speak ill of our brother or sister", he said.
