FIRST READING A reading from the book of Genesis 15:5-12. 17-18

Taking Abram outside the Lord said, 'Look up to heaven and count the stars if you can. Such will be your descendants' he told him. Abram put his faith in the Lord, who counted this as making him justified.

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 9:28-36

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James and went up the mountain to pray. As he prayed, the aspect of his face was changed and his clothing became brilliant as lightning. Suddenly there were two men there talking to him; they were Moses and Elijah appearing in glory, and they were speaking of his passing which he was to accomplish in Jerusalem. Peter and his companions were heavy with sleep, but they kept awake and saw his glory and the two men standing with him. As these were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' – He did not know what he was saying. Listen to him.' And after the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. The disciples kept silence and, at that time, told no one what they had seen.

The Gospel of the Lord

FROM FR. HENRY

Dear friends,



As we know, many Jews in Jesus' time believed that the righteous would wear white clothing in God's kingdom and live in tents as their ancestors used to live in tents when God brought them out of Egypt, through the desert and finally into the Promised Land.

They also called their Scriptures that we Christians call the Old Testament 'the Law and the Prophets', whose representatives were Moses and Elijah, since Moses received the Ten Commandments from God on Mt. Sinai, and Elijah was one of the greatest prophets in the history of Jewish people.

Significantly, the element of the tents and the two figures symbolizing the Jewish Law and the Prophets all appear in the Gospel this Sunday recounting the story of how Jesus transfigured himself before the eyes of Peter, John and James in the mountain, where Moses and Elijah appeared to converse with him and God the Father also made his presence to confirm Jesus as his Son and instruct the Apostles representatives of all people on earth to listen to him.

Seeing Jesus, Moses and Elijah in the divine glory, Peter and the other two Apostles thought to be transcended into the divine world, the Kingdom of God if you like, and he volunteered to set up the tents for Jesus, Moses and Elijah to stay.

Despite the Apostles' desire to prolong their encounter with the Transfigured Jesus and his divine guests, the Transfiguration moment came to an end at last and Jesus took his companions back to the real world where he was about to take them through his Passion, death and Resurrection which we are going to commemorate again in a few weeks' time.

Symbolically speaking, Jesus through his Transfiguration gives Peter, James and John a glimpse into the glory of his Kingdom to come, the one which shall be theirs given that they remain faithful to him even in death. Here Jesus seems to extend his invitation to us, his disciples of today to look upon such a glorious world and follow his foot-steps to enter it by taking up our daily cross of troubles and hardship. Let us pray for the strength to help us face our own difficulties with courage and turn them into credits.

POPE FRANCIS' CONDITION By Vatican News



On Wednesday evening, 12 March, the Holy See Press Office provided the following medical update on Pope Francis who has been receiving care at Rome's Gemelli Hospital since 14 February:

"The clinical condition of the Holy Father has remained stable, in the context of a complex overall medical

picture. The chest X-ray performed yesterday has radiologically confirmed the improvements observed in the previous days. The Holy Father continues to undergo high-flow oxygen therapy during the day and non-invasive mechanical ventilation during nighttime rest. This morning, after following the spiritual exercises in a link-up with the

Paul VI Hall in the Vatican, he received the Eucharist, dedicated time to prayer, and then continued with physical therapy. In the afternoon, after joining the spiritual exercises of the Curia, he continued with prayer, rest, and respiratory physiotherapy."

Let us continue to pray for our Holy Father, Pope Francis so that he will get well very soon and return to resume his papal office.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS FROM THE HOSPITAL

Text prepared by the Holy Father

Dear brothers and sisters,

Last Wednesday, with the rite of the Ashes, we began Lent, the forty-day-long penitential itinerary that calls us to the conversion of the heart and leads us to the joy of Easter. Let us commit ourselves to making it a time of purification and spiritual renewal, a path of growth in faith, hope and charity. This morning, in Saint Peter's Square, holy Mass was

celebrated for the world of volunteering, which is experiencing its own Jubilee. In our societies, too enslaved to market logic, where everything risks being subject to the criterion of interest and the quest for profit, volunteering is prophecy and a sign of hope, because it bears witness to the primacy of gratuitousness, solidarity and service to those most in need. I express my gratitude to those who are engaged in this field: thank you for offering your time and abilities; thank you for the closeness and tenderness with which you care for others, reawakening hope in them!

Brothers and sisters, during my prolonged hospitalization here, I too experience the thoughtfulness of service and the tenderness of care, in particular from the doctors and healthcare workers, whom I thank from the bottom of my heart. And while I am here, I think of the many people who in various ways are close to the sick, and who are for them a sign of the Lord's presence. We need this, the "miracle of tenderness" which accompanies those who are in adversity, bringing a little light into the night of pain.

I would like to thank all those who are showing their closeness to me in prayer: heartfelt thanks to you all! I pray for you too. And I join spiritually with those who in the coming days will participate in the spiritual Exercises of the Roman Curia. Together let us continue to invoke the gift of peace, in particular in tormented Ukraine, Palestine, Israel, Lebanon,

Myanmar, Sudan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. In particular, I have learned with concern of the resumption of violence in some areas of Syria: I hope that they cease definitively, with full respect for all ethnic and religious components of society, especially civilians. I entrust you all to the maternal intercession of the Virgin Mary. Happy Sunday, and *arrivederci*!

POPE FRANCIS: A LOVING SOCIETY MUST FREE WOMEN FROM PRESSURE TO SEEK ABORTION

As he recovers from bilateral pneumonia at Rome's Gemelli Hospital, Pope Francis has sent a message to participants in a pilgrimage organized by the Italian Movement for Life.

Cardinal Secretary of State Pietro Parolin read the message on the Pope's behalf on Saturday at Mass for the pilgrims gathered in St. Peter's Basilica.

"Continue to place your trust in women, in their capacity for welcome, generosity, and courage," said Pope Francis in his message. "Women must be able to count on the support of the entire civil and ecclesial community."

He lamented the pressure that contemporary society places on women with its focus on "possession, action, production, and appearance."

The Church, added the Pope, seeks to counter society's message by promoting the dignity of the human person and prioritizing those who are weakest in the world's eyes.

"The unborn child represents, in the fullest sense, every man and woman who does not count, who has no voice," he said. "Taking their side means standing in solidarity with all the discarded of the world."

Pope Francis called on Christians to foster a "civilization of love," which frees women "from the pressures that push them not to give birth to their child".

He said it takes a "gaze of the heart" to recognize unborn children as "one of us."

The Pope went on to praise the Italian Movement for Life, which was set up in 1975 and runs several centers that assist women with difficult pregnancies or who are under pressure to seek an abortion.

Their work, he said, promotes a culture of life "with frankness, love, and tenacity, closely uniting truth with charity toward all." As the movement celebrates its 50th anniversary, Pope Francis urged all those who seek to promote life to "advance the social protection of motherhood and the acceptance of human life in all its stages."

"In this half-century, while some ideological prejudices have diminished and young people's sensitivity toward caring for creation has grown," he said, "the throwaway culture has unfortunately spread."

The Pope called on everyone to dedicate themselves to the service of human life, especially when it is most fragile and vulnerable.

"[Life] is sacred, created by God for a great and beautiful destiny," he said. "A just society is not built by eliminating

unwanted unborn children, elderly people who are no longer self-sufficient, or terminally ill patients."

In conclusion, Pope Francis prayed that the Blessed Virgin Mary may watch over those who promote human life, and he asked them to continue to pray for him and his health.

The fluorescent uniforms of thousands of volunteers in Rome for the Jubilee of the World of Volunteering stood out in Saint Peter's Square during the Sunday Mass presided over by Cardinal Michael Czerny.

Thirty thousand people participate in the Mass on the first Sunday of Lent, and their colorful jackets created a chromatic spectacle, along with the purple liturgical vestments worn for the season of Lent.

Over a hundred concelebrants – including cardinals, bishops, and priests – came for the liturgy presided over by Cardinal Michael Czerny, Prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development. Pope Francis delegated Cardinal Czerny to preside since he has been in hospital since 14 February. But the Pope's spiritual presence among them in the celebration was symbolized in the papal banner with the papal crest displayed on the central loggia of Saint Peter's Basilica.

Thanks to the volunteers

In the homily prepared by Pope Francis, and read by Cardinal Czerny, the Pope focused on the beginning of the Lenten journey, but with special words for the volunteers from around the world visiting Rome on pilgrimage. The Pope recalled their service and commitment alongside so many people, "all those small gestures" that "in the deserts of poverty and loneliness" help "a new humanity blossom in the garden that is God's dream, always and everywhere, for all of us."

"I thank you heartily, dear friends, because, following the example of Jesus, you serve your neighbours unstintingly. On the streets and in homes, in the company of the sick, the suffering and the imprisoned, with the young and the elderly, your generosity and commitment offer hope to our entire society."

Jesus shows the way through the desert

Commenting on the Sunday Gospel, the Pope recalled the temptations Jesus faced in the desert, where He is "led by the Spirit." And our Lenten journey begins here, "by following the Lord there and sharing in that experience, which he transformed for our benefit." Because in that "place of silence," which becomes "a place of listening," the ability to listen is "put to the test," and then we must choose "between two completely different voices." In the desert, Jesus experiences hunger and is tempted by the devil's words, but He rejects them.

"We too are tempted, yet are not alone. Jesus is with us, to guide us through the desert. The Son of God made man does not simply give us an example of how to combat evil. He gives us something much greater: the strength to resist its attacks and to persevere on our journey."

Three characteristics of temptation

In his homily, Pope Francis explains the three aspects of Jesus' temptation and of our own: "its beginning, the way it takes place and its result," and invites everyone to compare these two experiences to find support in one's own "journey of conversion." He then explains, regarding the beginning of the temptation, "the Lord does not go into the desert to show the strength of his will, but out of filial openness to the Spirit of the Father, whose guidance he readily and freely accepts." On the other hand, our temptation "is not intentional: evil is prior to our freedom, attacking it from within, like an inner shadow and a constant threat."

"Whenever we ask God not to lead us into temptation, we need to remember that he has already answered that prayer through Jesus, his incarnate Word, who remains with us always. The Lord is close to us and cares for us, especially in times of trial and uncertainty, when the tempter makes his voice heard."

The latter is "the father of lies, perverse and perversive," the Pope clarifies, "for he knows God's word without understanding it. Quite the opposite: just as he had done since the days of Adam in the Garden of Eden, so he does now in the case of Jesus, the new Adam, in the desert."

Christ unites God and humanity

As for the way Christ is tempted, the Pope explained that it is "through His relationship with God, His Father." He went on to say how "the devil is the one who separates and divides, whereas Jesus is the one who unites God and man, the

mediator." And if "in his perversion, the devil wants to destroy that bond," Jesus makes it "a relationship that embraces everyone, without excluding anyone" and "a gift that he shares with the world for our salvation."

"Yet just when the devil would have us believe that the Lord is far from us, and would tempt us to despair, God draws all the closer to us, giving his life for the redemption of the world."

Jesus defeats evil and redeems us

Jesus "vanquishes evil," this is "the result of these temptations," concluded Pope Francis, "He drives away the devil," who will however, as the Gospel says, "return to tempt Him, waiting for 'another opportunity," that is, when "on Golgotha,

Jesus is tempted again: 'If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross'" But "in the paschal mystery of His death and resurrection" Christ definitively defeats "the tempter." We, on the other hand, are not always capable of defeating temptations.

"In the face of temptation, we sometimes fall; we are all sinners. Our defeat, however, is not definitive, because following our every fall, God lifts us up by his infinite love and forgiveness. Our testing does not end in failure, because, in Christ, we are redeemed from evil."

In conclusion, the Pope underscored how "Jesus himself opens up before us this new path of liberation and redemption" and by following Him in faith "from drifters we become pilgrims."


