FIRST READING A reading from the book of Exodus 3:1-8. 13-15

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law, priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said, 'and see why the bush is not burnt.'

Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am' he answered. 'Come no nearer' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father,' he said 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God.

And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow.'

"Sir," the man replied "leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down."

The Gospel of the Lord

FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends.

I just wonder how many of us still read the newspaper and watch the news or current affair programs on TV these days. I myself, have dropped the habit for a few years since I stopped the paper subscription due to its delivery becoming unreliable. Occasionally, I read news about Australia on the internet and recently I read that one of our former Prime Ministers made headlines here and beyond when he made comments about a current world leader describing him as harassing, bullying, erratic, rude and abusive.

Just like us today, the people in Jesus' time also had their interest in current affair stories and some obviously were in tune with the latest developments in the country as recounted by the evangelist in the Gospel this Sunday. They came to Jesus and told him two pieces of news: the first was about how Pilate massacred some Galileans and mingled their blood with the one from their sacrifices, and the second about 18 victims crushed to dead because of the fall of the Siloam tower. These peoples even provided their own interpretation of those deadly incidents which they considered as some sort of divine punishments for those involved.

Jesus, of course, refused to subscribe to such a simplistic viewpoint and he made it very clear those victims were not sinners at all and they died because their time was up, rather than because they had sinned. 'They were not, I tell you,' twice he repeated this message to the crowds.

Instead of focusing on the death toll, Jesus was more interested in the positive response of his listeners to those misfortunes, and encouraged them to think of those incidents as opportunities for others to repent from their sinfulness and return to God. Just like the fig tree, the symbol for each of us he used in the second part of the Gospel, planted in the vineyard but failed to bear any fruit, the owner of the vineyard, the symbol of God, wanted to cut it down, but the gardener, the symbol of Jesus pleaded with him to give it an extra time for more care and fertilization in order to become productive.

This is the message Jesus seems to send to each of us in this Lenten time, that this is the time for us to get ourselves fertilized with God's grace through prayers, works of self-sacrifice, works of charity, and pray that we will grow and bear fruits of goodness and newness of life in Jesus.

POPE FRANCIS' CONDITION By Vatican News

On Wednesday evening, the Holy See Press Office released the following update on Pope Francis' health: "The Holy Father's clinical condition is confirmed to be improving. The Holy Father has suspended non-invasive mechanical ventilation and also has less need of high-flow oxygen therapy. Motor and respiratory physiotherapy is continuing to make progress."

"This morning, on the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, the Holy Father concelebrated Mass." The Pope's doctors have said that his lung infections are under control, although not eliminated. The values of his clinical analyses are in the normal range, and the Pope continues to be fever-free.

He spent his day receiving treatment, praying, and doing some work. No decision has yet been made regarding who will preside over liturgies during Holy Week.

Since the Pope's condition is stable, the next update on his health is expected no earlier than next week. The Holy See Press Office will give some general information to journalists on Friday, and again on Monday.

The last update on the Pope's health had come on Monday evening. On that occasion, the Holy See Press Office had said that "the Pope's condition is stable, with slight improvements thanks to respiratory and motor therapy."

"He is using high-flow oxygen therapy with nasal cannulas less frequently," the press office added, "and at times he does not require oxygen therapy. At night, he uses non-invasive mechanical ventilation."

Pope Francis has been receiving treatment for bilateral pneumonia at Rome's Gemelli hospital since the 14th February. Let us continue to pray for our Holy Father, Pope Francis so that he will get well very soon and return to resume his papal office.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS FROM THE HOSPITAL

Dear brothers and sisters,

Text prepared by the Holy Father

Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

Today, the second Sunday of Lent, the Gospel tells us about the Transfiguration of Jesus (*Lk* 9:28-36). Having climbed to the top of a mountain with Peter, James and John, Jesus immerses Himself in prayer and becomes radiant with light. In this way, He shows the disciples what is hidden behind the gestures He performs in their midst: the light of His infinite love.

I am sharing these thoughts with you while I am facing a period of trial, and I join with so many brothers and sisters who are sick: fragile, at this time, like me. Our bodies are weak but, even like this, nothing can prevent us from loving, praying, giving ourselves, being for each other, in faith, shining signs of hope. How much light shines, in this sense, in hospitals and places of care! How much loving care illuminates the rooms, the corridors, the clinics, the places where the humblest services are performed! That is why I would like to invite you, today, to join me in praising the Lord, who never abandons us and who, in times of sorrow, places people beside us who reflect a ray of His love.

I thank you all for your prayers, and I thank those who assist me with such dedication. I know that many children are praying for me; some of them came here today to "Gemelli" as a sign of closeness. Thank you, dearest children! The Pope loves you and is always waiting to meet you.

Let us continue to pray for peace, especially in the countries wounded by war: tormented Ukraine, Palestine, Israel, Lebanon, Myanmar, Sudan, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

And let us also pray for the Church, required to translate into concrete choices the discernment made in the recent Synodal Assembly. I thank the General Secretariat of the Synod, which over the coming three years will accompany the local Churches in this undertaking.

May the Virgin Mary keep you and help you to be, like Her, bearers of Christ's light and peace.

THE VOICE OF POPE FRANCIS AND THE MAGISTERIUM OF FRAGILITY By Andrea Tornielli

On the twelfth anniversary of his election to the papacy, our Editorial Director reflects on the magisterium of fragility Pope Francis has shown as he continues to recover in Rome's Gemelli Hospital.

This year, the twelfth anniversary of his pontificate falls at a particular moment for Pope Francis, who has been living in his hospital room on the tenth floor of Gemelli Hospital for almost a month. The news coming from the latest medical bulletins is encouraging, his prognosis is no longer guarded, and hopefully he will be able to return to the Vatican soon. Still, what the Pope is going through at this time undoubtedly makes this anniversary of the beginning of his pontificate very unusual. The same year that has seen Pope Francis' longest intercontinental journey (to Indonesia, Papua New Guinea, Timor Leste, and Singapore); the conclusion of the Synod on Synodality; and the opening of the Holy Door that inaugurated the Jubilee, now witnesses this delicate passage. The Successor of St Peter, sick among the sick, suffers and prays for peace, accompanied by the chorus of prayers of so many people around the world. He, who in these twelve years has never concluded a meeting, a catechesis or an Angelus without the words, "Please do not forget to pray for me", today feels the embrace of so many believers and non-believers who care deeply for him.

It is revealing: it is a time to consider the nature of the Church and the mission of the Bishop of Rome, which is so different from that of the general manager of a multinational corporation. Twelve years ago, the then Cardinal Bergoglio addressed the General Congregations, quoting Henri De Lubac's opinion that "the worst evil" the Church can incur is "spiritual worldliness": The danger of a Church that "believes she has light of its own", that counts on her own strength, her own strategies, her own efficiency, and thus ceases to be the "mysterium lunae", that is, no longer reflecting the light of Another, no longer living and acting only by the grace of the One who said: "Without me you can do nothing".

Remembering those words once again, today, we look with affection and hope at the windows of the tenth floor of Gemelli Hospital. We thank Pope Francis for this magisterium of fragility, for that still feeble voice of his that has joined the Rosary in St Peter's Square in recent days—a fragile voice that continues to implore peace and not war, dialogue and not oppression, compassion and not indifference. Happy anniversary, Pope Francis! We still need your voice so much.

POPE FRANCIS: CATECHESIS

Cycle of Catechesis – Jubilee 2025. Jesus Christ our hope II. The life of Jesus. The encounter 1. Nicodemus. "You must be born from above" (Jn 3:7b)

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

With this catechesis we will begin to contemplate some of the encounters narrated in the Gospels, to understand the way Jesus gives hope. Indeed, they are encounters that enlighten life and bring hope.

It can happen, for example, that someone helps us to see a difficulty or a problem we are experiencing from a different perspective; or it can happen the someone simply gives us a word that makes us feel that we are not alone in the pain we are going through. At times there can even be silent encounters, in which one does not say anything, and yet those moments help us to get back on track.

The first encounter I would like to look at is that of Jesus with Nicodemus, narrated in chapter 3 of the Gospel of John. I will start with this episode because Nicodemus is a man who, with his history, shows that it is possible to emerge from darkness and find the courage to follow Christ.

Nicodemus goes to Jesus at night: it is an unusual time for a meeting. In John's language, temporal references often have symbolic value: here the night probably refers to what is in the heart of Nicodemus. He is a man who finds himself in the darkness of doubt, in that darkness that we experience when we no longer understand what is happening in our lives and do not see clearly the way forward.

If you are in the dark, of course you seek the light. And John, at the beginning of his Gospel, writes: "The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world" (1:9). Nicodemus therefore seeks Jesus because he has sensed that He can illuminate the darkness of his heart.

However, the Gospel tells us that Nicodemus does not immediately understand what Jesus is saying to him. And so we see that there are many misunderstandings in this dialogue, and also a lot of irony, which is a characteristic of the evangelist John. Nicodemus does not understand what Jesus is telling him because he continues to think with his own logic and categories. He is a man with a well-defined personality; he has a public role, he is one of the leaders of the Jews. But probably something no longer adds up for him. Nicodemus senses that something no longer works in his life. He feels the need to change, but he does not know where to begin. This happens to all of us in some phases of life. If we do not accept to change, if we close ourselves up in inflexibility, in habits or our ways of thinking, we risk dying. Life resides in the capacity to change to find a new way to love.

Indeed, Jesus speaks to Nicodemus of a *new birth*, which is not only possible, but even necessary at certain moments in our journey. To tell the truth, the expression used in the text is already ambivalent in itself, because *anōthen* (alphavw) can be translated as either "*from above*" or "*again*". Slowly, Nicodemus will understand that these two meanings go together: if we allow the Holy Spirit to generate new life in us, we will be born again.

We will rediscover that life, which was perhaps fading in us.

I chose to begin with Nicodemus also because he is a man who, with his very life, shows that this change is possible. Nicodemus is able to do it: in the end he will be among those who go to Pilate to ask for the body of Jesus (cf. *Jn* 19:39)! Nicodemus has finally *come to the light*, he is reborn, and he no longer needs to stay in the night. Changes sometimes frighten us. On the one hand they attract us, at times we desire them, but on the other we would prefer to remain in comfort. Therefore the Spirit encourages us to face these fears.

Jesus reminds Nicodemus – who is a teacher in Israel – that even the Israelites were afraid when they were walking in the desert. And they focused so much on their worries that at a certain point those fears took the form of venomous snakes (cf. *Nm* 21:4-9). In order to be freed, they had to look at the copper serpent that Moses had placed on a pole, that is, they had to look up and stand before the object that represented their fears. Only by looking into the face of that which frightens us can we begin to be set free.

Nicodemus, like all of us, can look at the Crucified One: the One who defeated death, the root of all our fears. Let us also lift our gaze to the One they pierced, let us also be met by Jesus. In Him we find the hope to face the changes in our lives and be born again.


